Coordination and commitment: How is ESJP organized?

An invitation to understand ESJP better....

ESJP has been around for almost 20 years and in that time has moved through many different struggles and turbulent times, as well as different ways of seeing problems, framing them, working together to understand them and move towards better alternatives. ESJP was born in Canada, grew up in England, the US and Australia and spread its roots into Colombia, Brazil, Puerto Rico, Denmark and beyond.

Usually when we meet in person at the annual conference, we have time to update, reset and share our histories, welcome newcomers to our network and explore what we mean by social justice and peace together. This period has been unsettling for many reasons, and we have been dealing with fragmented online conversations and communications. Many new members joined us at the 2018 USD conference and since then we have welcomed many on discord (online platform). Many have not yet encountered an ESJP conference, some have not met any of us in person, so it can be confusing to understand what ESJP is all about.

How is ESJP structured?

Well, the first thing to know is that it isn't – by design. In the very first conference in 2004 we labeled ourselves *counter hegemonic* and also *organic*. Since then, we have grown organically – like rhizomes – never quite knowing where our underground roots will surface. We are constantly reassessing ourselves against our commitments. ESJP is a loosely joined network of justice-inspired people, a support network, a movement and a liminal space to question the status quo and to consider new alternatives. But we are not a membership organization. There are no fees. There are no structures or systems. And there is a lot of love.

These are our foundations – our key working principles - and we constantly refer back to these to guide us.

The Founding members (4) are present to maintain the value system of ESJP and uphold the commitments over the years.

The secretary - currently Leon Santen, is always a remarkably selfless individual who supports us by sharing, building and creating our network through our emails, discord, heartspace and website.

Elected members (4) There are no terms of reference or times of service, there are no performance metrics. Invitations come when we have a space and when we feel we are missing a particular voice. Self or peer nominations come when anyone is passionate enough about our values to offer their support. Anyone wishing to join the committee must have always attended at least one ESJP conference. A vote will be held where needed.

Communication across differences is never easy. Language changes, understandings shift, meanings vary. The only way for us to learn together is to share our wisdom and our ignorance, our confusion and our humility. We welcome everyone willing to move into this space of love and learning, to share knowledge and experiences and most of all develop the ability to listen to others.
